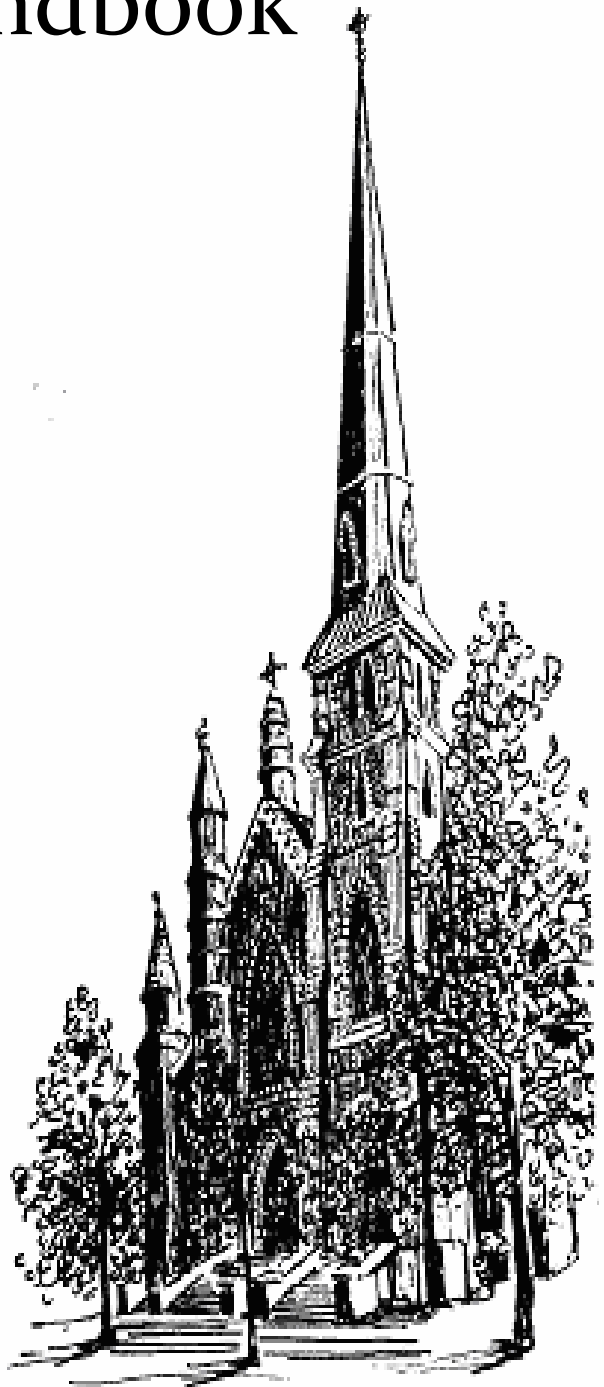

## **ST. MARY'S CHURCH**

Dedicated as Christ Church in 1834, St. Mary's was the first Catholic Church in New Haven, and the second in Connecticut. After the Church was completely destroyed by fire in December 1848, a new building on Church Street was dedicated under the care of Mary, and renamed St. Mary's Church. With the rapid growth of the Catholic population, in 1851 plans for a new church were enacted. The cornerstone at the new location on Hillhouse was laid in 1870, and the church dedicated in 1874. In 1982, in recognition of the 100th Anniversary of the Knights of Columbus, the church went through a complete renovation, including restructuring of the sanctuary, erection of the steeple, and the addition of the organ.

## **THE VENERABLE FATHER MICHAEL J. MCGIVNEY**

Father Michael J. McGivney was ordained on December 22, 1877, and assigned to St. Mary's Church. It was here in 1882 he founded the Knights of Columbus with the intention that this group would strengthen the faith of the men of the parish and care for the widows of members. Today, the Knights is the largest Catholic fraternal benefit society in the World. Father McGivney spent seven years at St. Mary's, being assigned pastor of St. Thomas in Thomaston in 1884, where he died in 1890 at the age of 38. In 1982, his remains were re-entombed at St. Mary's Church. In 1997 Archbishop Daniel Cronin opened the cause for Father McGivney, and in April 2008, Pope Benedict XVI declared him Venerable.

## **THE DOMINICAN FRIARS**

St. Mary's Church has been under the care of the Dominicans since 1886. The friars are members of the Province of St. Joseph, based in New York City. The present priory building was erected in 1907, and provides an environment for prayer, study, silence and community. The Dominicans residing at the priory serve multiple areas, including the parish, the Shrine of the Infant of Prague, the Knights of Columbus, and the chaplaincy of Our Lady of Grace Monastery of Dominican nuns in North Guilford.

## **THE SHRINE OF THE INFANT OF PRAGUE**

Established in 1945 through the Eastern European Shrine of the Infant of Prague, they continue to honor Christ by this title. Mass is celebrated every day at noon for intentions requested through the shrine, and for all who are in need. Dominican Friars conduct a number of Solemn Novenas and novenas of Masses throughout the year. **The Shrine Office & Gift Shop**, located in the lower level of the priory, offers many devotional items and religious books available for purchase. The shop offers the opportunity to have intentions remembered in the Masses and prayers offered by the Shrine; or to enroll oneself or loved ones in the Shrine Prayer Society.

### **SPIRITUALITY & LITURGIES**

A committee of parish council members and other parishioners who are responsible to recommend ways that will continue to foster and deepen our faith and commitment to parish worship.

## **PARISH LITURGIES**

**ALTAR SERVERS:** To be able to assist the priest in the celebration of the Mass is a great privilege. Servers assist in many roles during the Mass — carrying the cross, processional candles, incense and censer, and assisting the celebrant as required. We continue to seek out boys and young men to serve on Sundays and at special Masses. An altar server must have already received first Holy Communion, and is expected to fulfill all responsibilities with appropriate reverence.

**EUCCHARISTIC MINISTERS:** To assist with the distribution of Holy Communion at Sunday Masses is a great privilege and an enriching opportunity for spiritual and personal growth. It is also a public expression of devotion to the Holy Eucharist. We continually seek people who are willing to serve. An extraordinary minister of the Holy Eucharist is expected to dress appropriately and move about the altar with respect and dignity.

**LECTOR MINISTRY:** The opportunity to proclaim the Word of God within the context of liturgical celebrations with excellence at Sunday Masses is a great privilege granted by the church for the good of the community and of each lector. We continually seek people who are articulate, can project their readings well, and are willing to serve once or twice a month at an assigned Mass. The lector is expected to dress appropriately and move about the altar with respect and dignity.

**MINISTRY OF WELCOME:** In their service of welcoming and assisting during liturgical celebrations, ushers pass out bulletins, collect donation envelopes, and otherwise ensure that the tasks of the congregation proceed smoothly. We welcome more volunteer ushers.

**MUSIC MINISTRY:** The parish choir is a choral ensemble of volunteer singers who contribute time and talent to enrich our Masses and special events. The choir regularly leads the singing of the hymns and an English setting of the Ordinary of the Mass, as well as the Responsorial Psalm rendered in Anglican chant and an anthem at the Offertory.

**THE SCHOLA CANTORUM:** The Schola Cantorum is a professional choral ensemble of singers that provides the music for the 12 noon Sunday Mass from September through the Solemnity of Corpus Christi feast day. The Schola regularly sings the Gregorian chant as well as Latin propers. The ensemble draws on the magnificent heritage of Catholic sacred music for its extensive repertory from the Middle Ages to the present.

## **RELIGIOUS EDUCATION / SACRAMENTAL PREPARATION**

**CATECHESIS OF THE GOOD SHEPHERD:** A highly acclaimed approach to the religious formation of children, rooted in the Bible, the liturgy of the Church, and the educational principles of Maria Montessori. Children gather in an “atrium,” a room prepared for them which contains simple yet beautiful materials that they use to ponder the story of Christ and the life of the Church. Elements of the Mass, a topographical map of the Land of Israel and a timeline for the History of the Kingdom of God are just a few of the experiences the children encounter in an atrium that serves children ages 3 to 6, 6 to 9, and 9 to 12.

**RELIGIOUS EDUCATION:** Our program offers instruction for children from Grade 1 through Confirmation in the high-school years. Following the teachings of the Catholic Church, it offers a curriculum that draws upon the “Faith and Life” series published by Ignatius Press, as well as other materials, especially the Catechism of the Catholic Church and the Bible. Classes are held on a weekday evening in the Parish Hall beginning in early fall and ending at Pentecost. The program also includes various liturgical and social events.

**RITE OF CHRISTIAN INITIATION OF ADULTS (RCIA):** The RCIA provides doctrinal and spiritual formation for those desiring to enter the Catholic Church. Through prayer, study, and discipleship, it allows each person to learn more about their journey of faith and leads to full participation in the Roman Catholic Church through the celebration of the Sacraments of Initiation at Easter.

**CONFESSION & FIRST COMMUNION PREPARATION:** Confession and first Communion preparation is open to children of all ages; however, typically for children in first and second grades. Children are to be enrolled in religious education classes the year prior to the year of sacramental reception as a norm. For example, if a child is to celebrate the Eucharist in second grade they are to be enrolled in first grade the year prior

**CONFIRMATION PREPARATION:** Students in the ninth and tenth grades attend the two-year Confirmation program. Candidates are to be enrolled in religious education classes the year prior to the year of sacramental reception as a norm.

The movement was officially recognized by Pope John Paul II on February 11, 1982.
